IMPROVEMENT GOALS

- 1. Use each NCEPOD report recommendation checklist to assess local practice & report the status to the Executive Board
- 2. Use the QI tools provided for each report to focus on specific areas for improvement
- 3. Executive Boards need to encourage implementation of NCEPOD recommendations & help share in the learning

The findings of 'Consolidation Required', a review of community acquired pneumonia were adopted and embedded into the National Respiratory Audit Programme (NRAP).

Data from past reports have been used to capture examples of healthcare inequalities — published in a summary report updated in 2024 — commissioned and promoted by NHSE.

Responding to 'Endometriosis:

A Long and Painful Road' RCOG Vice President for Clinical Quality, said: "Endometriosis is a chronic condition that can have a significant impact on the physical and mental health of those living with it, and delayed diagnosis is currently a significant issue. "This insightful 'deep dive' into how women and people with endometriosis are cared for by the NHS found room for improvement in around half of the patient cases studied. Clear recommendations are provided for NHS organisations, Royal Colleges and individual teams to support through audit and quality improvement initiatives."

We have attended local audit/QI meetings to talk about NCEPOD's work programme and, held three online local reporter days with around 150 attendees at each one. Many of them sharing examples of how our reports recommendations are used locally.

We held a public webinar for 'Endometriosis:

A Long and Painful Road', advertised through
Endometriosis UK, joined by 150 participants. We provided
a patient leaflet of questions people could ask if they
experiencing signs or symptoms of endometriosis.

914 patients were involved in an online survey for **'Endometriosis: A Long and Painful Road'** to give their views on the quality of care they had received.

NCEPOD continues to recruit to a panel of lay representatives to support our entire work programme who are involved from the study design period until report publication.
